

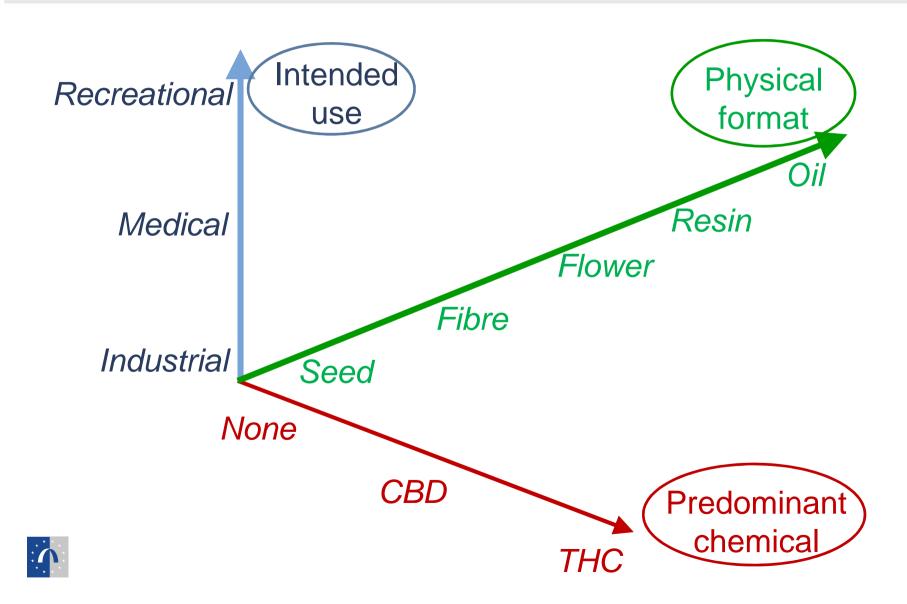

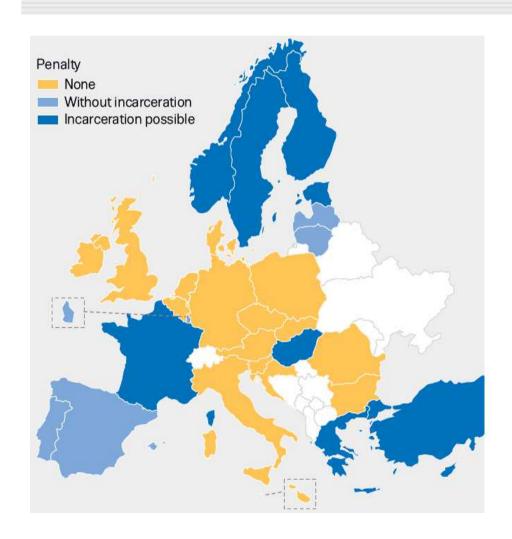

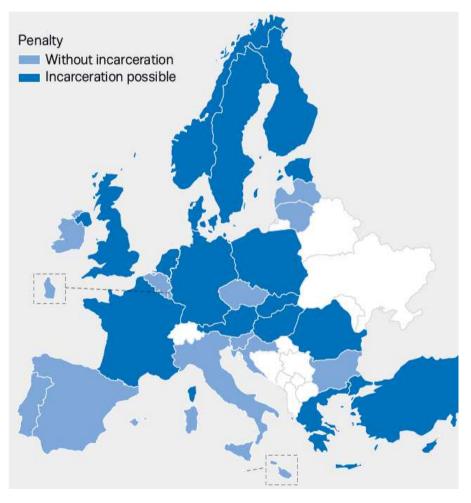


"Cannabis" might differ by:



Incarceration for minor consumption / personal possession ?

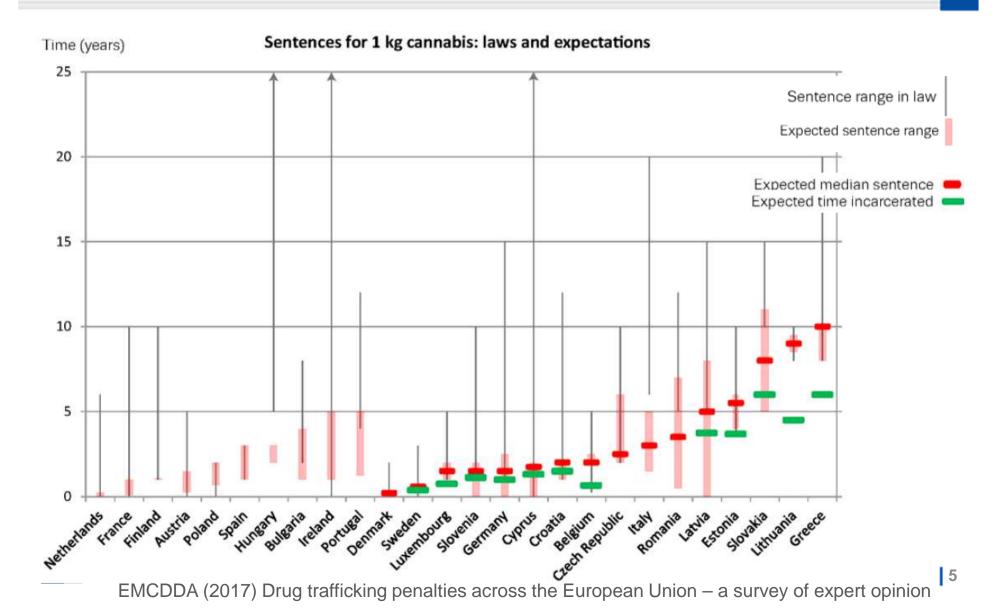




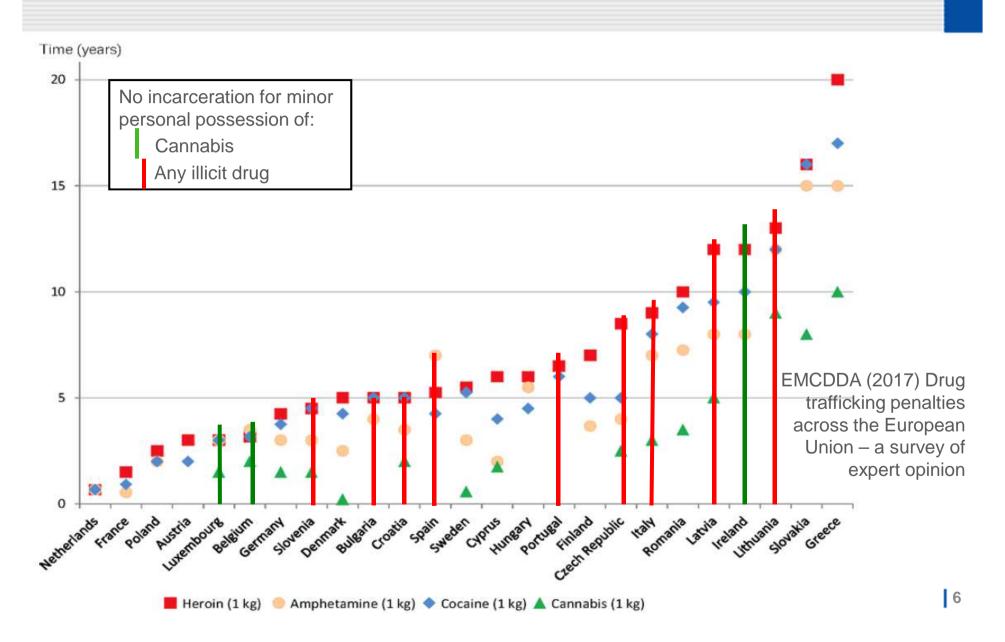


Sentences for supply of 1kg cannabis

Tough on supply, but not personal possession?



WHY change the law?

Reducing penalties:

- Encourage addicts to treatment
- Save law enforcement resources
- Bring law closer to practice (credibility)
- Non-drug related reasons

Increasing penalties:

- Send a message
- Give law enforcement more powers

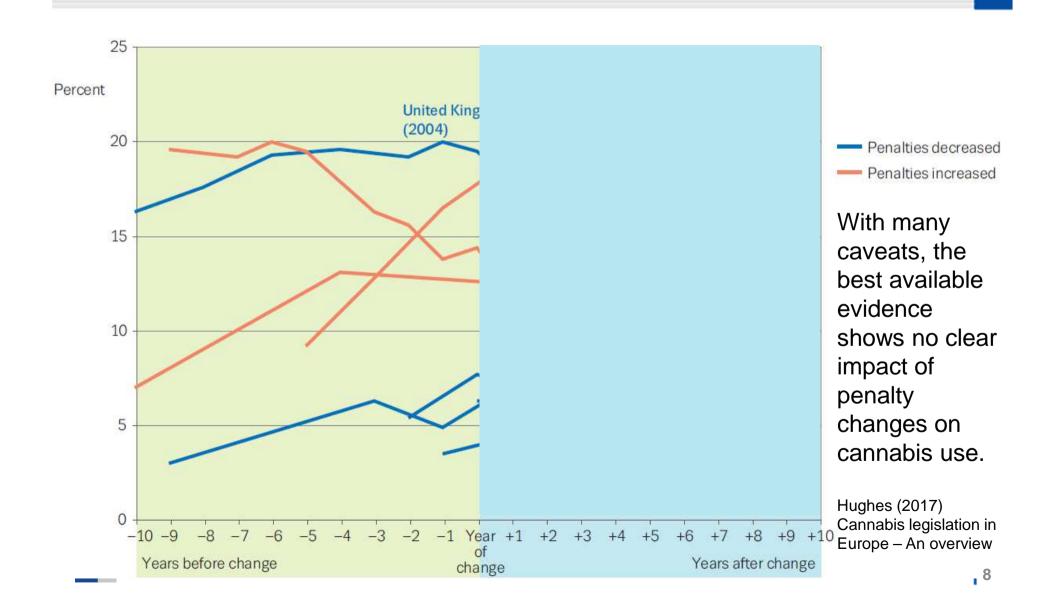
Legalisation:

- Concentrate on serious crime
- Save law enforcement resources
- Raise tax revenue (?)
- Limit access for children
- Product quality control





Cannabis use before and after changes in legislation in selected countries: use in previous 12 months among young adults (age 15-34)



Legalisation

An authorised / non-punished system of supply

Supply models include:

- permission to grow and consume in a private place only
- shared growing among a group of club members (cannabis social clubs), no sale
- Government growing and public sale, non-profit
- Commercial growing and public sale, for profit...



Legalisation may vary by the "10 Ps" [RAND / Kilmer 2015]

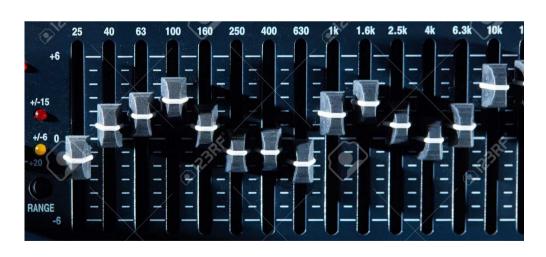

USA vs EU: 4 legal differences

- 1. Caregiver medical cannabis system since ±2000, commercial since 2009 (= available for most adults)
- 2. Direct to consumer advertising of prescription medicines
- 3. Commercial freedom of speech
- 4. Ballot initiatives [24 states] vs. parliamentary / technical debate 1996-2004; 7/8 states passed medical cannabis by ballot initiatives.



In the near future?

- Spain: social clubs are "illegal" but 2015 law only penalises personal growing or use in public / visible space
- Netherlands: proposal to formalise production and coffeeshops
- Italy: two proposals (parliament/citizens) for commercial legalisation
